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## Teacher assistant qualifications texas

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In addition, the Texas Education Agency has its own special requirements if you want to be certified as a teacher's aide. You can achieve certification as an Education Aide I, Educational Aide II or Education Aide III, depending on the education and experience you have achieved. When you reach a higher certification level, your duties as a teacher's assistant increase. Complete a high school diploma or its educational equivalent, such as a GED. Enroll in college and complete either an associate or a higher grade, or at least 48 semester hours of college courses. Complete at least some of the learning children's growth and development or related areas if you want to end up qualifying for a Texas Education II or Educational III certificate. Instead of college, contact the school district where you plan to work and ask which state or local academic assessments you can make that show your knowledge and/or ability to assist in teaching reading, writing and mathematics. For example, some school districts may allow you to perform and pass the ParaPro assessment test offered by the education testing service. Look for a job or volunteer experience in an environment that allows you to work with students or parents before applying for a job as a teacher's assistant. For example, you can work with a church or private school, day camp or youth group, or in a licensed day care center. Contact the school district before you gain this experience and ask if it meets the district's approval. Apply for a position as a teaching assistant in the desired school district. Complete employment requirements, such as submitting fingerprints and information for background checks. Consult your employing school district about how you can meet the eligibility requirements for education aide certification. In Texas, your school district must recommend you certification before you can apply. In some cases, you may need to meet additional requirements in your school district. Create an account on the Texas Educational Agency's (TEA) website (see Resources) after your employed school district is you get an educational aide certification. On the Tea Website, select Educator Login and Create a New Account. Submit an online application the education support certificate to which you qualify (e.g. I, II or III education certificate). Before you have the right to apply for an education aide certificate, you must first be employed in the school district. For instructions on the application, contact your school district. Educational Aide I requirements to be a high school graduate or hold a General Educational Development (GED) certificate to have experience in working with students or parents approved by an employed supervisor Experience can be a job in church-related schools, day camps, youth groups, private schools, licensed day care centers, or similar experiences. The education aide II requirements to be a high school graduate or have a General Education Development (GED) certificate that meets one of the following requirements, have two creditable years of experience as an Educational Aide I; or at least 15 semesters of college credit with a certain emphasis on children's growth and development or related fields; or have demonstrated the skills in the specialised field of skills identified by the local school district; and have experience in working with students or parents approved by the requirements of the employed head of The Education Aide III, be a secondary graduate or have a General Education Development (GED) certificate; meet one of the following requirements: have three creditable years of experience as an educational aide I or II; or have 30 semester hours of college credit with some emphasis on children's growth and development or related fields; and have experience in working with students or parents approved by the supervisor Perform Duties that are teaching in nature or provide direct services to students or parents. Serves in a position for which the teacher or other professional has ultimate responsibility for the development and implementation of educational programmes and services. By Chron Contributor Updated May 19, 2020 Educational Paraprofessionals hold multiple titles across the U.S., including educational technicians, teacher aides and Assistants. In Texas schools, they are commonly referred to as educational assistants. The paraprofessure provides assistance to students with special needs and is certified by the school district in which they work. They must meet several state and federal requirements to obtain a paraprofessional certificate in Texas. There are three levels of education aide certification in Texas. At each level, applicants must have at least a secondary or GED diploma. Education Aide 1: In addition, applicant for Education Aide I certification must have prior experience working with children or parents, either in a school environment or in a facility such as camp, daycare, youth group or church school. Education Aide II: Applicants must either have at least two years of experience as an Educational Aide I or have completed at least 15 semester hours of secondary education related to education or child development. Level II assistants take on greater responsibilities, such as leading tests and helping groups of students with their classroom assignments. Education Aide III: This top certification requires an applicant to have at least three years of experience working as an Education Aide I or II or has taken at least 30 semesters of relevant college classes. With level III qualifications, a paraprofessional can take on complex tasks, such as instructing students with little supervision. According to the Texas Education Agency, federal law requires that any paraprofessional working in schools that receive Title I funding is highly qualified. This usually means that you have to have an associate degree or complete at least 48 semesters of secondary education. Section I schools serve a large number of children from low-income families, and paraprofessionals in these schools can be expected to assist in the instruction of math, reading and writing. Educational assistants who do not meet these requirements can prove that they are highly qualified, taking and passing a local or national examination that tests their ability to perform these duties. A couple of websites provide opportunities for individuals with Texas education aide certificates who are looking for paraprofessional jobs. The Texas Education Agency site links job seekers directly to job posting websites for individual state and charter schools in the state. TXReap is another workplace serving Texas schools. Many Texas school districts require applicants to apply online, while some can still accept paper applications.
